TNC Meeting Minutes
June 25, 2018 - CUMC - Room B113

I. General

- A. All attention is on national elections scheduled for July 30. The priority candidates are Nelson Chamisa for the MDC Alliance and President E Mnangagwa for Zanu PF. There was a bomb explosion assassination attempt of President Mnangagwa at a rally in Bulawayo on June 24. The president was not hurt, but 2 others were killed and several were injured.

- B. A 23 year old individual was stealing transformer oil from a high voltage tower at Nyadire and electrocuted himself. This knocked out power to Nyadire for a day.

- C. US Sanctions remain on Zimbabwe. Although there have been promising meetings and discussions, the USA states that specific action steps have not yet been taken.

II. Fund Development (Debbie Little)

A. Crowdfunding

- 1. The crowdfunding campaign raised \$20,109 plus \$5000 from St Paul's Conway Munden fund for a total of \$25,109. \$19500 was sent to Nyadire in May and an additional \$5000 in June for completion of the HOH administrator house.

- 2. Excellent work day at Healthy Village Learning Institute in McKeesport on May 19 and also a follow-up work day held on Sat June 23. These work days were a result of meeting the crown funding goal of \$20,000.

B. TNC Month at Dutilh

- 1. "TNC Month at Dutilh UMC" was held from April 15 to May 5. Very successful. Funds collected from the "Gift Tree":
 - a) Pharmacy Supplies: \$120.00
 - b) School Uniforms: \$532.00
 - c) Tertiary School Scholarship: \$150.00

- d) DUMC Trip Sponsorship: \$3,000.00
- e) Outreach Orphan Sponsorship: \$200.00
- f) On-Going Orphan Sponsorship \$40.00
- g) O-Level Exam Fees: \$100.00
- h) Rural Clinic Project: \$3,537.86 These clinic funds include all proceeds from a Lemonade Stand!

In addition to these funds, some amount was also collected from craft sales.

2. Dutilh is planning a VIM trip to Nyadire in summer 2019. About 10 people are now interested including families and some of the pastors. Dutilh expects to raise funds to offset some of the individual trip expenses.

III. [Health - \(Mark LaRosa\)](#)

A. Container Shipments - (Drew Harvey & Rev L. Mukundu)

1. The container which departed Pittsburgh on April 30 continues enroute to Mutambara. It is scheduled to arrive at Beira, Mozambique on June 26 where it will be offloaded to a truck for transport to Mutambara UMC Mission. Typically this takes 2 weeks so arrival at Mutambara might be around July 10. We will advise Nyadire as soon as we know a specific arrival date as they will send a truck to collect the Nyadire items. In general, Nyadire has medical supplies, eyeglasses, pastoral supplies, handmade baby blankets and hats, sports equipment, educational supplies and books, female hygiene kits and sewing machines for the GEP program, and sewing supplies for the HI program.
2. The next container from BBF to Zimbabwe will primarily be filled with furnishings for Dindi Clinic. Hannah Mafunda has advised that we should use the same clinic furnishings list that was used for earlier clinics. BBF is checking what items they have available and TNC will also search for specific items on the clinic list. TNC expects to add GEP materials and sewing machines, backpacks, birthing kits, eyeglasses, educational supplies, and 2 solar powered sewing machines from GCC. Shipping date from Pittsburgh, or possibly Northern Va, is not yet scheduled but could be late July or later.

3. The organization "ZONTA" donated several thousand birthing kits which are now at the storage unit in bags. We will decide with BBF if they should be placed in boxes. Medical supplies from John Mahalchak are also at the storage unit. As the container ship date is known, we will coordinate with Grove City College for delivery of the 2 Solar Powered Sewing Machines.

B. Eye Glasses - (Don Ziegler & Dr Larry Tanyanyiwa)

1. Recent Trip to Nyadire (April 13-May2)
 - a) Served 1,103 patients. Spent 1 week in Chikwizo and 1 week in Dindi. 5 Assistants Participated at various clinics (Nurse Primrose, Iton, Obey, Artwell, Fadzai)
 - b) Local Youth recruited at both locations. Pastor participated at Chikwizo, and Local Commissioner helped at Dindi.. Rev. Forbes Matonga and his wife came to observe our work at Dindi.
 - c) Overall hugely successful 2 clinics.
2. Western PA Annual United Methodist Conference (Grove City College, June 6-9)
 - a) Had table exhibit for TNC Eyeglasses Program. Met and worked with Diane and Jack Welty (they had 2 tables for crafts & TNC) Placed Mission Vision Eyeglasses bins in 25 new churches (we desperately need eyeglasses)
 - b) Diane referred visitors from crafts to the Eyeglass table. Identified 2 churches that may want to join TNC
 - c) Next year would like to have a new separate table for current TNC programs and have help from others staffing it. Don Z will take the lead assembling the TNC exhibit. We need an updated TNC tri-fold brochure.
3. Future Travel to Nyadire
 - a) Next trip to Nyadire may be in the late September to October timeframe; plan to conduct Eyeglasses Clinics in Chindenga and Mashambanhaka at that time.

- b) Don Z is planning to accompany EWB students to Nyadire in Late December, early January. May conduct follow-up clinics and advanced optical training at that time.
 - c) Don Z expects to travel to Ghana and Nyadire in January with the organization CCIH - "Christian Connections for International Health". Don would conduct eyeglass clinics and CCIH would bring doctors who perform cataract surgery. Permits must be applied for quickly if cataract surgery is part of the Zimbabwe trip.
4. Other / Misc.
- a) Donated Eyeglasses Needed, Mission Vision is almost out. Might you have other location/s where a Mission Vision Donation Bin can be placed? Locations include Churches, Libraries, Business Offices, Schools, etc.
 - b) Met with Jackie Campbell, communications director of Western Pa UMC . Working with her to obtain speaking opportunities at other churches regarding TNC and our Eyeglasses Program, and other programs.
 - c) Working with Brothers Brother to partner regarding Mission Vision and Eyeglasses trips to other areas served by BBF. Met with Luke Hingson (President) and several members of his staff.

C. Girl Empowerment Pad Program - (Bonnie Lawson & Charity Horiro)

- 1. Pittsburgh Based Activities:
 - a) A workshop was held at MLUMC UMW Meeting to complete the GEP Kits. Members of Project Linus (CUMC) participated in the event.
 - b) Paradise UMC (Mt. Pleasant) completed 250 GEP kits and donated two sewing machines. One sewing machine (Antique) was exchanged for a store credit at Gloria Horn Sewing Studio. Cotton fabric was purchased with the store credit.
 - c) Sewickley UMW completed 50 kits and donated other supplies. These were the kits that were unfinished from the last sewing party.

- d) GEP kits were received (Cindy Long) from Indiana, PA via the conference center. Thanks to Jackie Campbell for making this happen.
 - e) First United Bradford and Hill Memorial UMC completed kits and donated supplies. These supplies were collected at the annual conference. Thanks to Seth McClymonds and Tom Strandburg for making this happen.
 - f) Catherine Marion (Texas Sewing Bee) donated supplies and completed GEP kits (these were made on her long arm quilting machine!). These will be distributed to the schools for emergencies.
 - g) Doris Walter (First Bethel UMC) donated two large bags of fabric. She is on the outreach team and expressed interest in a potential workshop in the fall.
 - h) Ava Ekstam, a senior at Seneca Valley and member of Dutilh UMC, expressed interest in the program. We reviewed the requirements of her senior program and are exploring options for a sewing party at Dutilh UMC. I have provided her with information on the program and references on the MHM issue.
 - i) Uganda Mission Team reported that they added clothes pins to the kits. We will consider this addition to our fall kits.
 - j) Approximately nine sewing machines are awaiting repair. These are being stored at several locations and will be repaired once my new workshop is completed.
2. Nyadire Based Activities
- a) Charity has gathered reports for the participating schools. Thank you to Don Ziegler for carrying back items for Charity and Crescencia. A-level text books (gift for Annamore's son) were received promptly with only a minor custom charge.

- b) Hospital/Clinic Based Programs: Annamore, held a workshop at the Waiting Mother's Clinic at Nyadire. There is an increased demand of kits for the clinics.
- c) School Based Programs: Charity provided a summary report and the individual reports from the schools. Charity reports that the new curriculum advocates practical work, so the sewing machines are helpful in the implementation of the new curriculum. Six schools participate in the program. She reports that the health books are a blessing to the children and that they are self-explanatory. Charity is coordinating the request/design of storage options at each school. Highlights from these reports follow:
- (1) Nyadire Primary School: Exploring engaging a seasoned tailor to develop the staff so they can assist the students. This is particularly important for students who leave school after the seventh grade particularly the students in the Hearing Impaired School.
 - (2) Manhamba Primary School: Noreen Chitengu reports that they have engaged a seasoned tailor from the community and that a uniform project has been started. Uniforms are now been sewn and sold at the school. This has opened the opportunity for the girls to learn pattern making, constructing simple skirts and sewing GEP pads. Noreen also provided a list of items that would be helpful in expanding the program. Electric irons are much in demand
 - (3) Musanhi Primary School: F. Chikonyora (Program Director), reports that thirty-five girls are enrolled in the GEP program and are receiving MHM training. The donated machines were used to sew the kits.
 - (4) Nyamhara Primary School: No written report

(5) Katsukunya Primary School: E. C. Muungwa (Head) MHM training was completed for 48 girls and 30 girls are in the GEP program and learning to sew them on the machines. The head reports that they would like to see this program continue and report that the girls are coming to school during their menstrual days and that learning is not being disturbed.

(6) Nyakabau Primary School: Fiona Chiroroma reports that both the students and the teachers are enjoying the benefits of the having sewing machines. The Nyakabau community has also become engaged. Young mothers are enjoying cutting and sewing clothing. Fiona provided a detailed list of items that would support the expansion of this program such as patterns and additional machines.

3. Workshops/Presentations Scheduled:

a) September 9th: 3 pm to 6 pm. Sewing party at MLUMC.

b) Fall Sewing Party: Senior Project Ava Ekstam (Dutilth UMC). Date to be determined.

D. Medical Supplies - (Irina Sheyko & Wilson Nhamoinesu)

1. Nyadire has proposed that funds be supplied to them rather than directly to PCD as PCD is frequently out of requested items requiring Nyadire to look elsewhere.
2. Received consumption report from Wilson for the months March, April, May. Drug utilization pattern remains similar to previous reporting periods. In general, medication dispensing appears to have decreased significantly compared to last year. This may reflect patient visits and admissions to the hospital and current economic status in the country.
3. It is noted that in the month of May, an antibiotic named Cotrimoxazole was dispensed ~7 times higher than any other months. The hospital received the unusually higher amount of this antibiotic from the NatPharm

that month as well. So, the supply and demand seems to match. Same extrapolation cannot be made to all medications, as the majority of the the drugs used at Nyadire are not supplied by the government.

4. The invoices for the drug purchasing were also provided, and they total \$1,356 (out of ~\$3,000 sent to PCD). The drugs were collected in April and at the beginning of June. Wilson reports that PCD has been hit with major drug shortages lately.
5. Wilson states that medicines in shortage at PCD are available at other companies. We will not yet send funds directly to these companies as they have not been evaluated. Irina Sheyko will send a message to Dr Tanyanyiwa and Wilson N. proposing that we send funds directly to Nyadire Hospital and they will purchase drugs wherever they are available. A process will be agreed upon such that TNC receives invoices and reports as to where and how the medicines are purchased. The normal quarterly amount of \$3000 will be sent to Nyadire Hospital in July and we will evaluate this approach before deciding upon the future procedure.

E. Rural Health Clinic Rebuilds - (Ralph Duckworth & Rev Austern Chepiri/Hannah Mafunda)

1. Rebuild of Next Clinics

- a) Construction work is active at Munyarari Clinic which is one of the 5 clinics administered by Old Mutare Hospital. The organization coordinated by Dave Talbot, "Chabadza Healing Hands Across Zimbabwe" has provided funding. A container of furnishings for Munyarari assembled by BBF departed Baltimore in early March.
- b) DAVANN Construction Company owned by David Nyatoti was selected as the contractor for all labor to construct the Out Patient Clinic up to wall level at Munyarari.

- c) DINDI - GBGM approved \$278,944.57 for the rebuild of Dindi Clinic. Hama, the builder of Chikwizo, Nyahuku, & Dendera has been awarded the construction contract and the groundbreaking ceremony has been held although construction work has not yet begun. The community is organizing materials and Hannah Mafunda is coordinating project administration with GBGM. TNC will work with BBF to obtain clinic furnishings which will be sent via ocean container.

F. Medical & Hospital Support - (Sue Bower & Dr Larry Tanyanyiwa)

1. 25 boxes of medical books (only 3 years old!) donated by an RN at St Paul's UMC are being delivered to TNC's storage unit by T. Greway.
2. Blessing (18 yr old Nyadire High School student) Update:
 - a) Before departing Zimbabwe, Don Z met with Dr. Ronald, Blessing, Blessing's Guardian & Sister (cousin), and Emancipate in Harare. Paid another \$100 for final diagnosis (total paid to date \$800.) and received this diagnosis in late May from Dr Ronald (with 3 options & cost estimate).
 - b) The diagnosis was forwarded to Stephen Tsou's father and he provided his opinion. Don Z also visited his personal orthopedic doctor and this doctor is providing a pro-bono opinion of the diagnosis.
 - c) Denny Hunt completed application for grant from The Shriners for Blessing's potential surgery. Two concerns are her age and surgery must be performed in the US.

IV. Education (Molly Michaels)

A. O Level Text Books - (Sandy Mcknight & E. Chiimba)

1. We will check, but in general we believe textbooks for the necessary O-Level tests have now all been purchased.

B. Engineers Without Borders/CMU - (Drew Harvey & Rev L. Mukundu)

1. Program is now mostly inactive as students are away on summer break until September.
2. Six EWB students have been selected for the travel team which now hopes to go in late December. This trip will monitor the ongoing performance of the Solar Light System as well as obtain data for the design of the Bio Gas Cooking System which is being developed for Nyadire Primary School. Tentative travel dates are Dec 27 - Jan 13 and the team hopes to include an excursion to Vic Falls.
3. EWB continues to await Nyadire's response to a number of questions related to planning and design of the Bio Gas cooking system.

C. Grove City College Partnership (Mark LaRosa/Dr Markley & Rev L Mukundu)

1. GCC is working to put a Memorandum of Understanding together with Africa University.
2. Dr. Markely and Dr. Hosack of GCC visited AU in April and together with AU faculty, identified the following potential areas for collaboration:
 - a) Entrepreneurship and Innovation
 - b) Social Work and Sociology
 - c) Volunteer Missions/Community Service Projects (AU Student Affairs seemed very interested in this idea.)
 - d) Robotics: GCC Department of Mechanical Engineering and AU College of HANS
 - e) Modern Languages: Curriculum and Language Lab Issues
 - f) Biology and Biochemistry: Curriculum and Research Opportunities
 - g) Department of Education: Curriculum and Research Opportunities- GCC feels able to move forward with the first 2 bullet point areas and will continue to find key individuals both at GCC and AU to continue to move forward with the remaining bullet point areas.

3. Stephen Tsou of CMU also joined the GCC trip. .

D. Scholarships (Molly Michael)

1. Sister Rut Scholarship Fund - General program overview is complete as well as the application. At this time, we are ready to accept applicants who are already receiving funds from various donors as well as payment from those donors.
2. We are planning a "launch" party to introduce the scholarship program and generate starting funds to support new applicants. Launch of the overall program is targeted for Oct / Nov.

E. Hearing Impaired (Molly Michael & Tendayi Mushapaidze)

1. Solar hearing aids for 9 children are awaiting pick up in Mutare. An audiologist from Harare will be scheduled back to Nyadire to work with the children once they receive their hearing aids.
2. Three students have left the program (Rashid, McLean, Tinadge). However, 3 new students have been admitted so the number of students remains the same at 24.
3. The HI program now has 15 sponsors - we plan to organize a "push" for more sponsors as the target is 24 sponsors by Nov. Molly would like to provide a presentation on HI to any organization interested.
4. Teacher Evaluation Trip - Program staff visited the Henry Murray School for the Deaf in Masvingo. An informal follow-up report & video have been received.
5. Backpacks (many from Baldwin CUMC) for HI students are being assembled

F. MISC.

1. Jennifer Matthews, a teacher at Quaker Valley High School, has expressed interest in working with TNC on a 12 week course that teaches innovation and design thinking with a Global Perspective. Ms Matthews is checking if her school is able to work with a faith based organization such as TNC.
2. Hippo Water Rollers -Nyadire reports the 2 obtained for evaluation are being well used and would like 4 more - one for each of the remaining 4 rural health clinics. However, we must first define a better method for customs clearance as the last units encountered extensive delays.

V. Relationships

A. VIM Trips - (Molly Michael & Rev L. Mukundu)

1. EWB will travel to Nyadire in late December, 2018
2. Planning is active for possible trips in fall/winter of 2018, and certainly 2019. Leaders are needed.
3. A Dutilh VIM team plans to travel in summer 2019. Dutilh UMC will raise funds to underwrite trip cost.

C. Christmas Connection - (Pat Cook & Rev L Mukundu)

1. Christmas Cards signed at CUMC & St Paul's UMC and will be at Dutilh UMC this week. Next churches could be Mt Leb UMC and/or Baldwin Community UMC.

D. ROTARY Program (Phil Himmler & Rev L Mukundu)

1. Rotary Global Grant - apparently the Zim UMC does not plan to go forward with this proposal.

E. Pastor Partnership - (Faith Geer & Rev Forbes Matonga)

1. No update

A. Seeds of Hope - (Jim Howell & E. Arichara)

1. Program is now canceled - await resolution on customs clearance of 7 boxes of vegetables seeds mailed in Oct, 2017.

VII. Orphans - (MB Zollars)

A. Overall:

1. Don Ziegler delivered letters from Nyadire and all have been delivered to the sponsors.
2. Approximately \$16,000 is needed to provide a replacement vehicle for the HOH. TNC has \$7000 but needs to raise the remainder.

B. HOHO

1. Letters from the schools have been distributed to the sponsors.
2. Some of the schools have increased their school fees.

C. HOH

1. Wire transfer for July/August has been initiated.
2. Letters from the schools have been distributed with an update to the sponsors.

3. HOH RUMMAGE SALE at CUMC: Total sales = \$3346.65. Great thanks to Diane White and Kim Koser for organizing this event.
4. Administrator's House: The crowdfunding campaign raised \$20,105 and St. Paul's Conway Munden Fund granted \$5000. Great thanks to Jessica Mazzone for being the brainchild behind this effort and to her team of people! \$19500 was transferred 25 May. \$4330 more has been requested due to changes in pricing due to various currencies. The dollar, the note, and plastic all are valued differently. Emmanuel has been the project leader behind the entire construction. Plumbing, tiling, painting, and glazing are part of the final stretch. Emmanuel has provided many photos of the work going on. He now has laborers making farm bricks for the pig and chicken stalls.
5. Nyasha Katema is now living with Rev. and Mai Magobeya in Mutoko
6. Lovemore Mbozvi has received his glasses!!!! Thanks to Don Ziegler and Terri Snider at Mission Vision.
7. The new Tinotenda is making good progress, even though there continue to be challenges as she adjusts socially to this supportive environment.
8. Precious Muripo, after many years of waiting, has received her birth certificate! This will allow her to play basketball with the high school team to compete in provincial and national games. She is the high school's best player!!! This will also enable her to get a national ID, which will be critical to higher education and getting a job.

VIII. Promotions - Communications (Tim Wesley)

- A. Drew, Elsa and Tim met last week to review our communications plans and priorities. We currently have many ways to communicate with our various audiences, and we need to determine the best ways to spend our limited time and resources. Tim will review the overall plan again; in the meantime, we expect to focus on strengthening our communications and relationships with TNC's network churches, updating our presentations and brochures, and using our existing on-line tools (website and Facebook).

B. Recent and future activities include:

1. Updates to our website. We added new stories ("How We've Grown" and "Girls United Globally") and have updated the program descriptions and other information.
2. Brochures and presentations. We will collect the current versions and update them to ensure consistency and accuracy with TNC's current programs.
3. "TNC Month" packet. We will compile a packet to send to network churches who might want to consider hosting a "TNC Month" similar to what Dutilh has organized.

IX. Finance - (Richard Dickey)

- A. As of 5/31/2018 restricted funds were \$80,780 and unrestricted funds were \$15,162. Preliminary (not yet reconciled) results for 6/26/2018 show restricted at \$80,640 and unrestricted at \$17,498.
- B. \$6487 was transferred to the HOH on 6/26 for the budget of July and August. \$613 for school fees had previously been sent
- C. \$19,500 was sent on 5/28 and an additional \$4500 was sent to the HOH on 6/26 for completion of the HOH Administrator's House. Total is \$24,000.
- D. \$1950 transferred June 26 for 3 months of Physician Support
- E. \$1145 was transferred on May 9 to finalize payments of HOHO school fees.
- F. TNC expects to send \$3000 to Nyadire hospital (rather than company PCD) in early July for purchase of medicines and drugs. As explained in the program update above, this is in response to drug shortages at company PCD.
- G. TNC raised \$25,109 in the Crowd Funding campaign. This includes \$5000 as a distribution from the Conway-Munden fund at St Paul's UMC.
- H. TNC Month at Dutilh UMC raised a total of \$7680 as broken down above for specific purposes. Craft Sales also will contribute an additional amount to the total.
- I. The Rummage Sale at CUMC raised \$3,377.

- J. TNC has received \$7000 as a donation toward purchase of an updated HOH vehicle but must raise an additional \$9000 before the \$16,000 vehicle can be purchased.

X. TNC Organization / Miscellaneous - (Drew Harvey)

- A. D Harvey will schedule a work session to review TNC's organization structure. We will consider reduction of the number of programs now established, the effectiveness of our Area Leader concept, and discuss succession planning. All interested TNC people are welcome to attend.
- B. Rev. Duncan Charwadza a former district superintendent for the Marange District which is paired with the Indiana District will arrive Pgh June 28. His schedule is being coordinated by Rev. Kelley Schanely of the Washington District. The Saturdays that Rev. Charwadza is available are July 14 and July 21. The Sundays that are open are Sunday, June 8 and Sunday, June 15. A general TNC "meet and greet" might be possible on Monday, July 9 or Monday, July 23.
- C. Western Pa UMC Annual Conference was June 7,8,9. TNC, coordinated by Diane Welty, hosted a craft sale/informational table. Don Ziegler also staffed a table with info about the eyeglass program. Several contacts made that we will follow.
- D. Sara Dickey is coordinating a TNC Information Table which will be set up at the Western PA UMC "Mission University", held at the California University of Pa from July 12 - 15. The table will include all of TNC's brochures as well as the stand-up display of TNC programs.
