## TNC Team Completes Successful Mission Trip In June/July

We're back!

For the first time since 2020, TNC sent a team of 12 volunteers to Zimbabwe in June/July. Team members were mostly from the Pittsburgh area, but also included folks from Erie, Pa., New Hampshire; Maryland; California; and the country of Qatar!

Activities included events at the **Home of Hope** orphanage, coding training for teachers and students at Nyadire, and visits to four of the **rural health clinics**, including **Chindenga**.

## TNC Leadership Profile: Bonnie Lawson

**Editor's Note:** This is another in a series of profiles about TNC's Leadership Team, highlighting their roles and why they are involved in TNC.

**Hometown:** Currently lives in Presto, Pa. Previously lived in Mt. Lebanon, Pa., and West Virginia, and in Indiana during graduate school. Born in West Haven, Conn. Been in the Pittsburgh area for over 20 years.

**TNC Role:** Started by sponsoring several **Home of Hope** students, and currently sponsors Natasha, a **Hearing Innovation** student. Worked with many of the programs over the years and now leads the **Girl Empowerment Program**.

**What is your profession and how has that helped in your TNC role:**

I have a Ph.D. in Analytical Chemistry from Purdue University and worked for Mobay/Miles/Bayer for 20-plus years. Working for a large international firm, I could remain in the same company and work in different areas. I have worked in research, process improvement, manufacturing, quality, product stewardship and the supply chain. Each of these experiences has been provided me with insight to the various roles I have played in TNC. After Bayer, I taught Chemistry as an adjunct professor at CCAC for 10 years. I loved teaching without all the meetings! I am now retired. I got to work with people from all over the world both at Bayer and at CCAC.

**How and why did you get involved with TNC:** I am a member of **Mt. Lebanon UMC** and learned about the programs from friends. Over time, my husband, **Steven Schilling**, and I became more and more involved. I like being able to use my skills to help others, and the joy of meeting people from different backgrounds and countries lifts me up. I have been involved for at least 10 years.

**Why do you think TNC has been so successful:** TNC has had an amazing amount of continuity in its leadership for a grass roots volunteer program. There are so many opportunities to help and pitch in.

**Have you been to Nyadire and, if so, what's your favorite part about the trip:** I am not able to travel to Nyadire for medical reasons, but I'm still able to feel very connected to my teams, both here and over there. This network of women is strong and works well. It shows that you don't have to travel to Nyadire to make a difference. There is a place for everyone to help. I certainly appreciate the enthusiasm of the folks that can make the trip.

# Scholarship Students Gain Experience Through Attachments

As part of their higher-education journey, Nyadire students can gain valuable experience through “attachments,” which are similar to internships in the U.S. Below are several TNC scholarship students, with comments about their attachments:

## Tinashe Mapfumbidze

“I’m working for an Institution of Applied Entrepreneurship. My main hand in the company is marketing to find clients through advertising, and also preparing business tips each day when I’m asked to do so, as well as a salesman at fumigation as part of the daily activities when I’m not marketing. Fumigation is one of their projects. They fumigate houses and other affected areas. My main services are in the Institute of Applied Entrepreneurship, where I’m doing the attachment in the marketing area and decision making.”



## Fungai Chigumbura

“My attachment is going well. I’m enjoying my work. I am learning the roles and responsibilities of the work profile: Consolidating leave balances, writing weekly operational reports, writing confirmation of employment letters, making employment contracts, carrying out training needs analysis, performance appraisals. I’ll be going to another department because the organisation is big. I’ll be going to the Industrial Relations department, where I’m supposed to learn about the relationships of the employer and the employees in the organization. I still have a lot to learn, including safety and health, recruitment and selection process. I’m glad that I’m going to cover all the important things before the end of my training period.”

## Bernard Madyauta

“Some of the most exciting things are what we call land use zoning, whereby we attend to a person or company that needs to do development on a particular site/property. We refer to local development plans (maps) and see if the proposed use is permitted. It can be freely permitted or permitted through what we call ‘special consent,’ whereby we will evaluate if the proposal won’t affect the neighborhood in a negative way; negative impacts can be noise, traffic problems. For example, if one needs to propose a Medical Centre, it should site the positivity of the proposal so that he or she can convince the local authority that there’s need to propose that development.”

## **Lovemore Mbozvi**

“This is a short summary of my experience at Lenox Mine Mashava. Last year in May I went to Lenox TFT mine for attachment. It was a nice experience applying theory we learned at school into practical work. We started work at 6:30 am until we reach an 8-hour shift. Lenox Mine is a gold mine which is rich in iron-banded formation as well as quartz ore which contains a greater proportion of gold ore. After surveying for gold ore and taking samples, gold is mined using sublevel stopping. Gold is mined at blocks from vertical to horizontal. For gold ore to be processed to pure gold there are stages which we went through. We first did sampling, then drilling and blasting, then lashing. After that the ore goes to a mill for mineral processing where it is finally processed to pure gold. I learned a lot

from the mine. We learned five safety rules which were crucial to all workers. The rules helped all employees to work safely! As an attachee, I discovered the problem of flooding at deeper levels, so as an upcoming mine engineer I will design a way to remove that water from underground until it becomes possible to reach better gold reserves. Lenox Mine has a good grade of 13g per ton. I learned how to adapt into a new environment as well as being obedient to my bosses. I loved everything I experienced and it’s my hope that one day I will enjoy the future job!”

## **Tsungirai Makoni**

“I am attached at City of Harare Council. It has many departments, so I am working at the department of Finance in the Risk and Insurance office. In this department we mainly undertake the insurance of the City of Harare, and we make sure it is handled properly and that all assets are insured, including motor vehicles, buildings, etc. In the insurance section we undertake a number of policies such as fire, public liability, motor insurance and many more. So when a motor vehicle belonging to our company is involved in an accident we work with our insurance brokers and insurers, who determine the percentage they have to pay for the claim. The same applies when a fire incident happens. We also have a public liability whereby the City of Harare is responsible for the public. Claims can arise when a third party’s cars are damaged by potholes, or when trees fall on their property, or when pedestrians are involved in motor accidents.”



# Program Highlights From TNC's July meeting

Each month, TNC leaders gather by Zoom to review programs and discuss future plans. Below are highlights from our recent meeting:

## Health Area

- Eyeglasses: We're planning a clinic for later this year, possibly December, which could have higher attendance due to people traveling home for the holiday. **Nurse Primrose** would be able to run a clinic then.
- Ocean Container Shipments: We have no plans for a container shipment at this time but we continue to wait for a decision between **Brother's Brother Foundation** and the **Zimbabwe Association of Church-Related Hospitals (ZACH)** about the possibility of a future shipment.
- Girl Empowerment: In conjunction with partners in Zimbabwe, the program will be updated. The focus is expected to be on local purchasing and a fundraising/sponsorship/grant approach will be developed.
- Rural Health Clinic Rebuilds: Several members of the June/July VIM teams visited the **Chindenga Clinic** to get an appreciation of what the clinics look like in a "before renovation" condition. TNC should soon be able to send \$50,000 to Zimbabwe for the first phase of Chindenga, the sixth and final clinic to be renovated ... **Jim Gourley, Sue McCann** and **Ralph Duckworth** visited the **Chikwizo, Dendera** and **Nyahuku** clinics. All were clean and well maintained.
- Hospital and Pharmacy: We continue to work with Nyadire Hospital to identify and prioritize projects.

## Education and Relationships Area

- Engineers Without Borders/CMU: For the **biogas digester** project, the students are waiting for approval from the national EWB. Pending that approval, the target is to issue a purchase order in August with installation in September. The students would manage the installation remotely with daily updates from the contractor and inspectors. A student team would then travel to Nyadire in December to assess operations.
- Hearing Innovation: Thanks to **Kumbi Mutasa**, who purchased uniforms for the girls and hats for the boys ... During the VIM trip, TNC's **Deborah Swineford** (photo at right) taught the older classroom and did a fantastic job. The students really enjoyed the connection and time with her.
