TNC Meeting Minutes
Mar 29, 2021 - meeting via ZOOM

I. Opening Prayer

II. General

- A. Zimbabwe reported 35,710 COVID cases and 1430 deaths a month ago at our last TNC meeting. As of 3/28, cases have increased to 36,818 and deaths to 1,510. This is an increase of 1108 cases in March, which is significantly down from the 4390 cases in Feb, and the 20,000+ cases reported in January.
- B. As of March 2, lockdown restrictions in place since 5 January have been relaxed. The curfew now runs from 22:00 to 05:00, written permissions are no longer required for movement and intercity travel is now permitted. Businesses and markets can reopen, and schools and universities are working to reopen. Funeral gatherings remain restricted to 30, while other gatherings including church meetings are limited to 50 people.
- C. The Zimbabwe government is targeting to vaccinate 10-million people, including early shots for teachers and other leaders.
- D. The U.S. Government remains the largest overall bilateral donor to Zimbabwe with over \$341 million in U.S. assistance in 2020. These funds included over \$200 million for health, with a focus on prevention & treatment of the 3 most significant health threats of HIV, tuberculosis, and malaria. Twenty ventilators were recently contributed. The USA has provided over \$3.5 billion in assistance to Zimbabwe since 1980.
- E. Violence in NE Mozambique has increased in frequency and brutality primarily initiated by Islamic extremist. Thousands have been killed, and 500,000+ people have been displaced from their homes.

II. Health -

A. Container Shipments - (Drew Harvey & Rev L. Mukundu)

1. TNC was advised in early March that our storage space in Mt Lebanon is no longer available and that all items should be cleared. Several people worked quickly to package and label all items for shipment, as well as re-locate a large amount of materials planned for the eventual rummage sale. On March 15, BBF sent their truck which we loaded with 171 boxes.
 - a) 16 boxes of HOHO & HI teaching supplies and reading material
 - b) 55 boxes of medical supplies
 - c) 43 boxes of items for the Girls Empowerment Pad program including 10 sewing machines. Additional boxes and 2 more machines will be added. The total of 16 machines will be 6 manual and 10 electric.
 - d) 40 boxes of eyeglasses/supplies. Additional boxes will be added.
 - e) 5 boxes church devotional materials
 - f) 15 boxes of handmade blankets and caps
 - g) 1 box of TNC Christmas cards intended for 2020.
2. Steve McPherson has donated a 35 HP John Deere tractor, and a plow for use at the HOH. We are checking with ZACH to understand the custom clearance situation and if confirmed, this will be included with the container. The tractor is from 1973, but has low hours, has been refurbished, and Steve will install new, foamed tires. The option of selling the tractor here and using the funds to purchase a newer tractor in Zimbabwe was extensively discussed, but eventually we conclude it is justified to send this equipment.
3. Whatever container space is available after loading TNC's items and the tractor/plow will be filled with furnishings for Mashambanhaka Clinic. Working from the standard clinic furnishing list, BBF has indicated what they have available and will donate.
4. Additional items are expected from Don Z., MB Zollars, B. Lawson, M. Michael, & D. Harvey. As BBF has requested that we accumulate all these together to insure they are not misplaced, people should deliver to D. Harvey and he will deliver to BBF.
5. After the custom clearance situation is known, the container will be loaded and shipped. Expectation is that shipment may be in late April, which means possible arrival in Nyadire of August/September.

6. Cost of the shipment will be approximately \$10,000.
7. At this point, TNC does not expect to obtain another storage space and will not actively collect items for container shipment. We will opportunistically work with BBF to send items whenever they might be sending a container to Zimbabwe.

C. Eye Glasses - (Don Ziegler & Dr Larry Tanyanyiwa)

1. Faith Geer of St Paul's UMC initiated the eyeglass program in 2015. Working together with Mission Vision of Cranberry, Faith carried donated glasses to Nyadire and conducted the first vision testing clinics. In her honor, the program will be named the Faith Geer Memorial Eyeglass Program. Tim Wesley will update brochures, the Lenten Calendar, and other publications to show this new title.
2. Don Z. and Dr. Larry have agreed upon the following leadership for the Zimbabwe Eyeglass Team:
 - a) Primrose - Head Nurse at Dendera; Clinical Program Leader
 - b) Artwell - Nyadire Driver; Logistics Leader
 - c) Nurse Paul (Nyahuku/Nyadire)
3. A detailed plan has been developed that will enable an independent Zimbabwe team to conduct eyeglass clinics at Nyadire and each of the 6 health clinics once per year. The leadership team will have 3 leaders, 2 nurses, and a driver and will first complete an advanced training course which Don Z is now developing. Including travel, the eyeglass clinics will be conducted in 2 sessions - first at Nyadire, Nyahuku, Dendera, and Chikwizo and second at Chindenga, Mashambanhaka, and Dindi. The first event requires 19 days and the second event requires 17 days.
 - a) Yearly budget is \$9828 with the first clinic costing \$5003 and the second \$4825.
 - b) 1500 - 2000 patients will be served each year with an average cost of \$5.73/patient
 - c) S. McKnight has submitted a grant application to the St Paul's UMC Conaway-Munden fund which, if approved, would finance the first clinic. A fund raising plan is needed to sustain the program and ongoing clinics.

C. Girl Empowerment Pad Program - (Bonnie Lawson & Charity Horiro)

1. Preparation for Shipment:

- a) Packed and prepared documentation for the upcoming shipment. There are 14 sewing machines in the shipment (4 manual and 10 electric). The shipment also contains master kits for the production of 50 master kits for each of the 7 primary schools supported by the program. Master kit materials for 100 kits were provided to the waiting mothers program. Additional fabric and sewing supplies were provided to continue the support of school sewing programs.

2. Looking Ahead:

- a) Preparing a program update for key stake holders. Key stakeholders both here and in Zimbabwe will be asked for input into the next steps of the program. Since our program is very hands on and based on women working together, this pandemic has slowed implementation plans. The first step will be to assess the inventory and status at each of the schools and clinics.

3. B. Lawson is now TNC's contact with the "Stitching Together" group at St Paul's UMC. This group was previously "Creative Hands" and has provided many, many blankets/caps for newborns at Nyadire Hospital.

D. Medical Supplies - (Irina Sheyko & Wilson Nhamoinesu)

1. Funds transfer of \$3000 to company PCD is being initiated for purchase of drugs to be used in Apr/May/June of 2021. Next transfer will be in late June.

E. Rural Health Clinic Rebuilds - (Ralph Duckworth & Rev Austern Chepiri/Hannah Mafunda)

1. Mashambanhaka Clinic

- a) Monthly progress report for Feb, 2021 received from Rev Austern Chepiri on Mar 6. Phase 1 works are 100% complete and phase 2 is approximately 55% complete. Material supply from the communities continues to be delayed due to lack of funds for transport and that people are currently very busy tilling the fields. An inclusive stakeholders' review meeting was held onsite on March 1.
- b) TNC transferred \$28,543 on March 18 for payment to contractors as required to support continued construction.
- c) Total cost to rebuild Mashambanhaka is about \$274,000. TNC has advised that all construction should go forward to complete the work as funds will be available when needed.
- d) Furnishings for Mashambanhaka will be sent in the upcoming container on a space available basis, but remaining items will likely require another shipment.

F. Medical & Hospital Support - (Sue Bower & Dr Larry Tanyanyiwa)

1. Salary stipend for doctor sent for Apr/May/June via World Remit. Next transfer to be initiated in late June.
2. Dr Ronald Nyabereka is now in Harare working for a non-profit organization that supports the Ministry of Health on the treatment of Neglected Tropical Diseases.
3. The vehicle fleet at Nyadire hospital is in very bad condition with only the new ambulance and the one Land Cruiser operational.

4. As of Mar 29, Nyadire Hospital will be a COVID vaccination center for teachers, security forces, judiciary services, health care workers, religious leaders, etc. About 80 hospital workers have now received the vaccine and demand is increasing.
5. The son that survived the horrific accident of the Nyamayaro family is now out of the hospital and recovering at his uncle's home in Harare. Nyadire hospital provided him with a wheelchair.

III. Education and VIM Trips (Molly Michaels)

A. Engineers Without Borders/CMU - (Drew Harvey & Rev L. Mukundu)

1. The company of Blessing Jonga and Lewis Makurumure has been selected to provide the biogas cooking system for Nyadire Primary School. However, there continue to be inconsistencies in their proposal which the students are working to clarify.
2. Nyadire collected and weighed cow manure for 13 days to demonstrate the amount that can consistently be available as feed for the biogas digester. The average daily amount is 106 kg/day. EWB believes this is close to the amount needed to cook all meals required, but this has not yet been confirmed with the provider. Expectation is that a 20 cubic meter digester will be required.
3. EWB has requested that Nyadire conduct an additional test demonstrating the amount of food waste that can be added to the digester, Potentially, food and cow waste together could meet the feed requirements.
4. Target completion date (not committed) of the BioGas Primary School Cooking System remains Sept 2021. Installation will need to be monitored remotely as the students will not be able to travel to Zimbabwe until Dec 2021 or May 2022.

5. The EWB students now meet via ZOOM on Tuesday evenings. As some students are graduating, new leaders are being selected.
6. EWB is sponsoring an "Alumni Panel" on April 1 where previous students present how EWB influenced their careers. Cathy Wang and Kavin Sanghavi, both previous leaders of the Nyadire projects, are featured.

B. Sister Rut Scholarship Program (MB Zollars)

1. Scholarships

- a) AGRICULTURE - John Sperry has deposited funds with the "Foundation for Tertiary Education" that will provide agricultural scholarships at Africa University or other schools. Precious Muripo is the first potential candidate. She aspires to attend a college with a strong agricultural program. Also, Rodney Matonga (Rev. Forbes and Nyaradzai's son) is a leading candidate. He will be writing exams at Blackfordby Agricultural Institute in July (end of 1st year), where he is doing a diploma program (in contrast to a degree) in Agribusiness and Farm Management. After his exams, he will do a 9-month internship, at which time he will be awarded a diploma.
- b) Beauty (HOH/Tabudirira) on attachment at Mutoko Luxury Lodges (hospitality).
- c) Tinashe Mapfumbidze(MSU) is staying in Gweru. His classes are now on Google Classroom.
- d) Tsungirai Makoni will start her 4th year of study in Actuarial Science at the Univeristy of Zimbabwe on 12 April 2021.
- e) Campion Mujuru (University of Zimbabwe) is back at UZ taking exams (for the end of last semester)..
- f) Lovemore Mbozvi's program of Mining Engineering is totally online. Exams are done. He is currently searching for a company for his attachment.
- g) Bernard Madyauta has begun his next semester at the University of Great Zimbabwe.

- h) Fungai Chigumbura has completed his exams, and is beginning his first semester of his second year.
- i) Maryleen Dandira (Nyadire Teachers College) has returned to her teaching practice at Nyamhara Primary. TNC helped replace some of her classroom items that were damaged in the heavy rains.
- j) Lorraine Kapembeza: Africa University, Accounting; registered for second semester. AU opened online. It is currently the only university open.
- k) Ruth Makoni: HOHO/O-Levels/A-Levels: Catholic University, Business Management and Information Technology; funds sent for second semester.
- l) Takunda Pedzai: Midland States University, Human Resources Management; has happily started 2nd semester.
- m) Raymond Chimbwanda: HOHO/O-levels/A-levels: University of Zimbabwe; Financial Economics and Trade; waiting for 2nd semester.
- n) Stephen Chadamoyo: O-levels/A-Levels: University of Zimbabwe, (tuition only); Physiotherapy; 1st semester exams delayed until March.

2. WORK/STUDY:

- a) Lindarose Chibinge: Lindarose has been volunteering at the HOH for about 6 months. Her excellent work, dedication, and commitment has led to a new aspect of the Scholarship Program. Lindarose will receive a small monthly stipend for her work at the HOH. It will be her responsibility to pay for her own tuition and other expenses associated with getting her master's degree. She has agreed to work at the HOH throughout her studies. Indications are that she is interested in staying at the HOH after completion. She plans to enroll in a master's degree in Children's Rights and Protection. Funds have been sent for Jan-Apr.

3. Tabudirira Vocational Centre Candidates:

- a) Funds sent for uniforms and supplies required of the program.
- b) Fees (tuition and boarding) sent.

- c) Angeline Mujuru (Campion's sister) (HOHO): O-levels: Tabudirira Vocational Centre, Hotel and Catering, began 6 April 2021
 - d) Lorraine Chipembere (Fradreck's daughter) (HOHO): O-levels: Tabudirira Vocational Centre, Hotel and Catering, began 6 April 2021
 - e) Tinotenda Kadyautumbe (HOH): O-levels: Tabudirira Vocational Centre, Hotel and Catering, began 6 April 2021
4. On hold:
- a) Josphat Nyatoro (HOHO): O-levels: changed intention to pursuing 3 more O-level subjects in order to attend Harare Polytechnic. His scholarship will be re-visited a year from now.
 - b) Panashe Mafemera: O-levels/A-levels: University of Zimbabwe, Sociology, Market Research Analyst (tuition only) - waiting for next semester (January 2021?)
5. Finished
- a) Winnet (HOH/Tabudirira) has finished her attachment and is coming up with a business plan to help HOHO. (See HOHO.)
 - b) Godknows (HOH/Tabudirira) is awaiting results of his trade exams. He has embarked on a venture of establishing a food stand in Mutoko and has also found a job at a food outlet in Mutoko.

D. Hearing Innovation (Molly Michael & Tendayi Mushapaidze)

1. Mail call has been sent out to collect letters for the container shipment!
2. 2 boxes of books were donated from Susan Eyrolles (one of the sponsors) and will be included in the shipment.
3. Simbarashe Andrew Mandaza has been a strong leader and motivator of all things related to the Hearing Innovation programs at Nyadire. He hopes to attend Great Zimbabwe State University for a Masters in Special Needs specializing in Sign Language Education. The program is 2.5 years long, would be distance learning, and he would travel to GZSU during holidays. Fees are \$400/semester. M. Michael is working with Sim-

barashe on the application and TNC will consider some level of scholarship support.

4. The current HI newsletter shows costs for students in the HI Unit (education & boarding) as \$209 USD or 1794.00 RTGS per semester. M. Michael will determine the amount that TNC can support and initiate a transfer of funds.
5. Charles Niwita has "leveled/aged out" of the primary HI Unit and hopes to attend Emerald Hill Form 1 (in Harare). The cost is \$291 USD/term and M. Michael is considering providing some level of ongoing scholarship support.
6. As HI students grow older, some type of continued educational support is needed and Emerald Hill could be a good option as it is one of the few HI secondary schools in Zimbabwe. A few years back, Tendayi and Simbarashe visited Emerald Hill on a TNC sponsored trip.

E. VIM Trips - Molly Michael & Rev Mukundu

1. Depending on COVID restrictions, Molly hopes to lead a team to Nyadire sometime between June and August. The ability to travel may be made at the last minute as it depends on the COVID situation both here and in Zimbabwe. M. Michael, MB Zollars, and D. Swineford are currently interested.
2. Rev. Mukundu advises that teams are certainly welcome, but it depends on COVID restriction in place at the time
3. Embassy travel information, last updated 3/26/21
 - a) Intercity and interprovincial travel is allowed now.
 - b) Schools & Universities are making preparations for reopening.
 - c) Negative COVID Tests are required upon arrival. Visitors must wait in a holding center until results are available, which is expected to be within 72 hours.

- d) Unknown - what the holding site is like & where you would go if you tested positive???
- e) Testing is \$65-\$75

F. Misc

- 1. The project idea with Avonworth teachers & Nyadire teachers may be put on hold due to COVID complications to the school year. Molly will check.

IV. Orphans - (MB Zollars & Emmanuel Chiimba)

A. Overall:

- 1. Exam classes (grade 7, form 4, form 6) returned to school 15 March 2021. All other students returned 22 March 2021.
- 2. Boxes of books, children's magazines, games, balls, school supplies, and some backpacks have been packed for the upcoming container. All sponsors have been notified of the opportunity to enclose letters to the children.
- 3. Phil Himmler has donated space for storing VIM materials and crafts. Tatenda!

B. HOHO - Marie Hunt & E. Chiimba

- 1. During lockdown: ON HOLD: work on the roof at Manhembra Primary School. Rev. Mukundu has not yet reported, but the Outreach Committee Chairperson (from Manhembra Primary) reports that work is progressing.
- 2. During lockdown: ON HOLD: pricing, purchasing, and distributing of the backpacks and school supplies in Zimbabwe.
- 3. School fees have been sent for Term 1.
- 4. Funds sent for new tires for the Outreach vehicle.
- 5. A business plan is being proposed for Winnet (HOH/Tabudirira) to make uniforms for the HOHO students. Basic tenets of the plan:

- a) Winnet would be paid per uniform out of HOHO budget.
 - b) Upfront cost for fabric would be paid back (loan).
 - c) Winnet has space at the HOH (as of now).
 - d) Winnet is participating in the budgeting plan.
 - e) Priority schools are the primary level: Mutambwe, Gadaga, Rudawiro, Nyamhara, Musanhi.
 - f) Other schools to be added as plan progresses.

 - b) Vice Chair: Tawanda Muswe (Rudawiro Primary)

C. HOH - Debbie Soles & E. Chiimba

1. Playground equipment has been installed at the HOH. Great joy abounds! Many thanks to the generous contribution from the UM Church of Finland. There are also funds for a Culture Multi-Purpose Kitchen, as well.
2. Funds being sent for new uniforms and shoes for 13 of the children.
3. Lindarose continues to tutor the children and is preparing for her studies at either UZ or Midlands State.
4. Funds have been sent to support the newborn twins for formula born at the hospital after the mother passed away during childbirth.
5. Funds (from a donation) have been sent for a concrete slab needed for storing the maize temporarily before shelling. Scott Sanford will contact Emmanuel with options (storage bags?) as a simple slab will not be adequate to protect the harvested maize.
6. HOH Rummage Sale will be held outside on Saturday, June 6, in CUMC's parking lot. Details will be forthcoming.

V. Fund Development (Debbie Little)

1. D. Little and T. Wesley presented a proposal for TNC's 15th anniversary (2006 - 2021). The event(s) could celebrate the past 15 years and also

establish plans to sustain TNC for the next 15 years with the possible motto - "Forward 15".

2. "Forward 15" would include TNC leadership succession planning, and working together with Nyadire/Zim UMC on a future vision for both Nyadire and TNC.
3. Event timing is late year 2021, but planning needs to start soon. At least 2 committees will be formed and a letter will be distributed asking for members

B. Julianne Slogick of Mt Lebanon High school advised that students in their Global Studies Program have raised funds for the Hunger Program. B. Lawson will check status.

VIII. TNC Organization / Miscellaneous - (Drew Harvey)

A. HUNGER CRISIS

1. \$10,500 was sent vial World Remit on Mar 13,14. for purchase of food to be distributed for April. This will be the final transfer of funds for hunger and all account funds have been disbursed. Hopefully with the current harvest, food shortages will be greatly reduced. Working with the Nyadire Social Committee, TNC has now sent \$101,000 for food distribution from May 2020 thru April 2021 (11 months)
 2. Additional sugar and a 2kg bar of washing soap was added to this final food bundle of Cooking Oil, Sugar, Beans, and Mealie Meal. Bundles were distributed at Nyadire on Saturday, Mar 27 and we were provided with many photos and videos. A large "Thank You TNC Banner" was made and signed by people collecting food.
 3. Nyadire Social Committee to consider the idea of continuing the bulk food purchase with payments from individuals. Potentially the bulk purchase could be cheaper than individuals can buy on their own.
 4. D. Harvey will send a message summarizing the program and acknowledging completion.
- B. Christmas Connection - Nyadire Christmas cards for 2020 are included with the upcoming Container Shipment. At this time, we do not expect to send additional cards for 2021.
- C. The St Paul's Lenten Calendar is complete, beautifully done, and is digitally distributed. The calendar was also featured in the UM News Daily Digest on Mar 2. It has been broadly sent to all TNC supporters as well as placed on TNCs' website and Facebook page.
