<u>Faith Geer Memorial Eyeglasses</u> Program Don Ziegler, Dr. Larry Tanyanyiwa & Zimbabwean Clinic Technicians

- Natalie Geer announced as interim leader. She expressed her gratitude for the program being named after her mother, Faith Geer. The search for a permanent leader will continue, as Natalie has many other commitments.
- Don is stepping down as program leader but will continue to provide valuable training to new leadership and prepare for future eyeglasses clinics.
- The team in Zimbabwe has been informed of potential new leader.

- Don expressed his thanks to Drew and others for the opportunity to serve in promoting better eye health and vision in Zimbabwe. A debt of gratitude is owed Don for his hard work in establishing and running this program. Thanks, Don!
- Funds Available: Dr Larry has confirmed that \$850 (in US dollars) remains at Nyadire for future Eyeglasses Clinics. There are \$2,115 in the vision account with TNC, for a total currently available funds of \$2,965. VBX, the Vacation Bible Experience, has awarded their July offerings of approximately \$750 to the program. An additional \$250 will be necessary to carry out the next clinic. A second clinic should be held in 2022, requiring an additional \$4,000.
- Don to share with Natalie the contact info for someone at VBX
- Next eyeglasses clinic will be held based on the availability of Nurse Paul Chibanda. A nurse trained in the eyeglasses clinic process must attend clinics at the request of Dr. Larry for reasons of liability. Nurse Paul will likely not be available until after the June/July VIM team based on his current workload at Nyahuku rural medical clinic.
- St. Paul's Eyeglasses Processing Team at St. Paul's continues to do an outstanding job under the leadership of Kathy Belcastro with both the cleaning and processing of eyeglasses using the lens meter. Future transportation and disposition of eyeglasses will be coordinated by Terry Snider of Mission Vision and Nick Kokales of the Oakmont Lions Club.
- Lens meter System for CUMU Marie Hunt is working with Terry Snider of Mission Vision.
- Brothers Brother Foundation's Role in Eyeglasses Inventory: BBF will accept and store eyeglasses for Mission Vision and TNC future use. Deliveries and pickups at BBF should be coordinated through Terry Snider.
- Lions Club Role in Eyeglasses The Secretary of Oakmont Lions Club (of which Don Ziegler is a member), is coordinating the cleaning of used donated eyeglasses collected by the Lions Club. Nick Kokales, the Secretary, is coordinating the cleaning and collection of eyeglasses for District 14B (42 Lions Clubs), the district which is lead currently by Maryanne Belles. Maryanne was formerly an active TNC member at Baldwin UMC with Molly Michael. We also

have a team of 5 lead by Nick & Don that focus on the Lions eyeglasses program.

Dr. Christopher (Chris) Kumora has introduced himself to TNC via email and expressed interest in helping with the program. He is an optometrist living in UMP district (Mashonaland East / Murewah) "specifically Katiyo just before Mutawatawa". Dr. Kumora has been in private practice and public health for 25 years and is involved with various optometrical associations and the Lions Club, Harare, West. Dr. Larry says this could be a person helpful to the eyeglasses program. Molly Michael plans to be in touch with him to arrange for him to meet the June VIM team and Dr. Larry.

Clinics Ralph Duckworth, Austern Chepiri, Hannah Mafunda

- Sent a list of questions and comments regarding the Chindenga Clinic budget and cost estimates to the Conference Center Team in Harare
- Submitted a grant request to the United Methodist Foundation of PA. We should hear in June whether or not we will receive a grant.
- Received an individual donation of \$10,000 for the clinic.

Hearing Innovation Molly Michael & Tendayi Mushapaidze

- Events
 - A Boarding Kit donation will be facilitated through BCUMC in May. A group through Paradise UMC may also assist (connection is through GEP with Bonnie Lawson).
 - Sponsorship Event will be facilitate at Dutilh in May and BCUMC in August
- Updates:
 - HI received their computer cart from Computer Reach. Simbarashe sent photos of the students exploring their new technology.
 - Simbarashe has purchased 24 chicks for his broiler project through his Master's studies. The university encouraged learners to find sponsors for a kickstart community project which will sustain an educational type purpose. Proceeds will be channeled towards needs for the HI unit such as uniforms/materials.

Hospital / Pharmacy Mark LaRosa & Dr. Larry Tanyanyiwa

• Prioritization:

Dr. Larry provided a prioritization of the Hospital related projects. #1 is most urgent

- 1. Chemical Analyzer Repairs \$1390
- 2. Mortuary Repairs \$1660
- 3. School of Nursing Ceiling Repairs \$ 9973
- 4. Vehicle Repairs TBD
- 5. Solar Power Battery Repairs TBD
- For review and consideration Mark also received from Hannah Mafunda, a copy of the "Report on the Update of General and Medical Equipment at the Nyadire Mission Hospital prepared by Engineer Director Tawanda Mushiri (Consultant Biomedical Engineering) as of 5/21/29 (May 29, 2021)." This will be considered for projects.

• Chemical Analyzer:

The Funds were sent to Rapid Healthcare to start repairs on the Chemical Analyzer. $\frac{1}{2}$ of the estimate was sent on $\frac{3}{16}$, and the balance will be sent upon completion.

• Biomedical Engineer and University Students:

According to Hannah Mafunda, they are currently working with a consultant from one of the major universities in Zimbabwe. He is a Biomedical Engineer and is consulting for the Episcopal Area Health Board. He has been introduced to the three hospitals and he is aware of all the equipment that needs to be repaired at the three hospitals. In addition, they have agreed to include students from the university to help him on these projects, as well as any other work that the hospital executives deem necessary.

He will train the hospital maintenance teams to carry out repairs as well as the installation of the equipment that the health board is procuring under our current HSS grant for the three hospitals.

Nursing School:

Hannah Mafunda reports that negotiations with contractors regarding the ceiling repairs has resulted in a major setback with one of the contractors who was doing the kitchen renovations. His performance is unsatisfactory, and a different contractor is being considered to finish the kitchen. A different contractor may be needed to do the ceiling work.

Rodney Matonga (Rev. Forbes and Nyaradzai's son) is a leading candidate for an agricultural scholarship. He seeks financial assistance in completing his diploma at Blackfordby Agricultural Institute in Agribusiness and Farm Management.

Precious Muripo (HOH) has been accepted into the Prison Officer Training Program.

<u>Container Shipments - Drew Harvey / Rev L. Mukundu</u>

- The container arrived at Nyadire on Feb 16, 2022 and all items have now been distributed. No reports of damage or items missing.
- Transit time for this container was about 8 months from departure in Pittsburgh until arrival at Nyadire, which is approximately 4 months longer than normal. The container was held at the port awaiting customs clearance for about 5 months and incurred \$26,173 in storage and demurrage fees.
- Brother's Brother Foundation was able to negotiate this fee down to \$20, 686 and after much discussion, BBF offered to pay \$10,000 of the fee. TNC has paid the remainder of \$10,686.

- TNC has sent a message to Rev Alan Gurupira, and await a response, asking for a description of why this delay occurred and what can be done to avoid such extravagant charges on future shipments.
- We have received numerous photos and videos showing examples of receipt of material and expressing great appreciation.
- At this point, TNC is not planning to organize future container shipments to Nyadire.
- Brother's Brother Foundation is now aggressively working on providing medical and humanitarian support to Ukraine. Working in partnership with Allegheny Health Network, the Pittsburgh Technology Council, Giant Eagle and others, they are shipping supplies into Ukraine and neighboring countries. Several TNC network churches are encouraging donations to BBF. BBF also presented at a St Paul's "Working For Justice" ZOOM call describing their Ukraine campaign objectives and specifically what they are doing with donated funds.
- It may be time for this program to be declared dormant and request that Hannah Mafunda work directly with BBF to send supplies to all three area hospitals.

Engineers Without Borders - CMU Drew Harvey / Rev L. Mukundu

- The students of the EWB CMU chapter meet Wednesday evenings, with about 10 students in attendance. Students are responding to questions & comments from EWB National relative to the "Pre Implementation Report" that was submitted in December. Once this report is approved and finalized, work can proceed to place the purchase order for the bio-gas digester.
- Bio-gas digester to be installed in June or July, but this depends on obtaining eventual approvals from EWB National.
- Students expect the installation to be managed "remotely", meaning that no students would physically be in Zimbabwe to oversee installation. CMU is not allowing international student travel due to COVID concerns. However, the students are filing an "exception request" and if approved, two or three students might travel.
- The hope is for digester installation and student travel to occur in late June so that they could join the TNC team in Nyadire.
- Based on the amount of waste available, the Bio-Gas digester is expected to produce enough gas to cook ~ 38% of the required daily meals at the primary school. TNC and Scott Sanford are investigating a "high efficiency stove" sized to cook the remaining meals. This stove design could reduce wood consumption by about half of what is used with the current open fire system

GEP Bonnie Lawson, Charity Horiro

- Container contents distributed to the seven primary schools. Representatives
 traveled to Nyadire to collect the items that included "Master Kits". Each
 primary school received the materials for making kits. This involves cutting
 fabric and PUL and assembling the other items into a plastic zipper bag. Soap
 and sewing machine needles that were purchased in Zimbabwe were
 distributed. Sewing machines and other supplies were also collected by the
 representatives.
- The team at Nyadire Waiting mothers received their "Master Kits". They worked together to produce 233 complete kits that will be distributed to the Waiting Mothers clinics. The treadle sewing machine will be taken to Dendera.
- The team leaders provided photos of the distribution events and kit making process. Great team effort! You can find more information on our Facebook page.
- PUL (Polyurethane Fabric) sourcing: A USA manufactured material available in 50 yards bolts has been identified as a potential source. To date, efforts to obtain the specifications to facilitate order from a manufacturer in China have not been successful.
- Upon receipt of local school and clinic stock taking of GEP Kit components, a forward-looking plan will be developed. No spending is anticipated this month.
- Program fundraising is transitioning from in-kind donations (sewing parties/ kit preparations) and craft sales (limited opportunities) to cash / online appeals.

InReach Debbie Little

- Email sent to Rev. Roncolato at Stone UMC in Meadville PA, in an attempt to get an opportunity to speak either at the church or at Allegheny College to engage congregants/ students. No response.
- Spoke with Rev. Koi-Koi of Warren UMC. He is aware that folks at Warren are interested in getting involved with TNC. He will identify a main point of contact for TNC there. Ralph also has a contact, "Jay." Follow up requried.
- Ralph Duckworth to present a short children's message at St. Paul's 10:30 service this Sunday, March 27, around the theme of the Brick by Brick Lenten calendars that St. Paul's has distributed. Ralph will also provide a

- congregational mission moment presentation on Chindenga clinic and with perhaps additional information on the Eyeglasses Program and TNC's need for leadership (eyeglasses and VIM)
- Working with Karen Cahall to perfect payment method for donations/ sponsorships, especially for the Dutilh presentations in early May.

Micro Loans

- Many thanks to Louanne Baily for investigating the potential to restart a micro loan program/ personal and business financial training program at Nyadire.
- It has been decided that now is not the time to re-start the program, for the following reasons:
 - a. Lack of leadership at TNC, Pittsburgh
- b. Concerns of toxic charity how do we provide funding in a way that leads to self-sustainability and rather than reliance on donations for financial investment?
- c. Costs of the program at a time when we are starting a new clinic building project and have other, established, programs to fund
- d. Concern that funds will not be repaid. While some borrowers in the previous micro loan program created business opportunities and repaid loans, others simply did not repay or only partially repaid loans.
- Follow-up: Are there still funds on account at Nyadire from the previous micro lending program?
