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Chindenga Clinic Moon Shot: Mission Accomplished!

Earlier this year, TNC announced a "moon shot" – a goal to raise \$250,000 to enable the completion of the **Chindenga rural health clinic**. Thanks to the passion and support of many individual donors and our Pittsburgh-area network churches, mission accomplished!

For TNC and our brothers and sisters in Zimbabwe, the completion of Chindenga will mark the end of a 10-year, brick-by-brick journey to rebuild six rural medical clinics associated with the hospital at the United Methodist Mission in Nyadire, Zimbabwe. When the journey began, we had no idea how – or if



– we could raise the necessary funding, about \$1.8 million. But we were driven by the faith that these clinics would improve the standard of health care for tens of thousands of residents, especially mothers-to-be who would walk miles to have babies there.

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Mission Trip Planned For November

Ralph Duckworth, TNC Chairman, will be part of a TNC team visiting Zimbabwe in November. In addition to Ralph, others planning to go are: Margie Dold, Jim Gourley, Sue McCann, Robb Montgomery, Scott Sanford, Deborah Swineford, and Mary Beth Zollars.

"We look forward to spending time with our brothers and sisters in Zimbabwe," Ralph says. "Our planned activities include discussions with conference officers, a visit to District Superintendent Rev. Heather, a strategy session with the Nyadire Station Executive, and a visit to the Chindenga rural health clinic. We will also spend time with the children at the Home of Hope Orphanage, begin to develop a plan to refurbish portions of the guest house, and have discussions about TNC's Agriculture program and how it fits into Nyadire's plans."

Chindenga Clinic Moon Shot...

involved in the clinics
project from the start.
Hannah, health
coordinator of the
Zimbabwe Episcopal
Area Health Board, has
documented many

improvements in health care:

- With adequate staff housing, medical personnel at the clinics has more than doubled;
- With more space for waiting mothers and delivery rooms, at-home births have been reduced by about half;
- Clinics have adequate space to test and treat patients with malaria, and to ensure privacy and confidentiality for each patient;
- More shelters for expectant mothers has led to improved birth outcomes and post-natal monitoring;
- Additional housing for staff has enabled the clinics to accept more student nurses, expanding opportunities for education and jobs.

TNC Leadership Profile: Scott Sanford

Editor's Note: This is another in a series of profiles about TNC's Leadership Team, highlighting

their roles and why they are involved in TNC.

What is your profession and how has that helped in your TNC role: I am a retired agricultural engineer with a broad background in agricultural production. I worked in the dairy equipment industry designing equipment to milk dairy cows for 15 years and then spent 18 years at the University of Wisconsin-Madison working as a state specialist helping farmers and rural businesses become more energy-efficient.



Energy is used in all aspects of farming so I got involved with greenhouses, grain drying, crop storage, irrigation, refrigeration, and renewable energy. To get farmers (or any business) to save energy, the initiative must provide an economic savings. Sometimes it is just a matter of switching to more energy-efficient equipment but sometimes it requires a change in management practices. Convincing a farmer or a business owner to make a change requires education, persuasion and sometimes demonstrations. This experience is useful for determining how to convince TNC and Nyadire leadership to try new ideas. I also have grantwriting experience which will be useful as we move ahead to larger projects. And I have spent



plenty of practical experience cleaning the barn, feeding animals, milking cows, baling hay and harvesting corn on my dad's farm.

How and why did you get involved with TNC: I was invited by my friend, Carol Butler (left, with Scott and Esnath, manager of the Nyadire farm), to join a trip in 2019 because she thought my skills would be useful. During my first trip we installed a quarter-acre demonstration drip irrigation system (see photo on page 4) and they harvested a bumper crop of potatoes. Since then

they have expanded drip irrigation to over three acres. My university job was all about providing knowledge to help others; working with TNC and the folks at Nyadire is similar.

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TNC Leadership Profile...

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Why do you think TNC has been so successful: I think TNC is successful because of the personal connections with the people at the Nyadire Mission and Zimbabwe conference office and the attitude of not giving up. If it does not work as planned, we regroup and try again.

How many times have you been to Nyadire: My first trip was June 2019. In January this year I visited as the new Agriculture program leader and I'm planning to go again in November.



What do you like best about TNC: The people involved with TNC and at the Nyadire Mission are very dedicated to make things better for the people in and around the Nyadire region. Although it is hard work at times, there are successes to cheer about such as the purchase of a new corn planter and fertilizer spreader that we hope will improve yields during the next growing season.

How has your involvement with TNC helped you to grow as a disciple of Jesus Christ: It has given me an avenue to continue what I was doing at the university. So I'm still helping people but with new challenges and new things to learn.



What's your message to anyone who's considering getting involved in TNC or making a trip to Nyadire: If you have agricultural or business development experience, TNC could use your help. Zimbabwe is a challenging place to operate a business and requires some creativity. If you'd like to travel to Zimbabwe, the people are kind, the food is good and the scenery is magnificent. As for accommodations, be prepared for sponge baths and using solar lights to read. The cell phone service is spotty and you might see some mosquitos, but nothing worse than in Western Pennsylvania. And your trip leader might take you on a safari, or shopping in Harare for some great gifts.

Girl Empowerment Program Teaching Life Skills

"Give a man a fish and he will eat for a day. Teach a man how to fish and you feed him for a lifetime."



This proverb suggests that long-term capabilities yield greater benefits than short-term fixes, a philosophy that TNC's **Girl Empowerment Pad** (GEP) program takes to heart.

GEP, which teaches girls to sew their own reusable cotton pads, helps keep students in school and women at work during their menstrual cycles. The program has evolved to provide co-equal leadership from its Zimbabwean and U.S. partners, to help it become self-sufficient. Initially, U.S. volunteers provided fully sewn pads to TNC schools and clinics in Nyadire. Next, volunteers assembled kits with materials and instructions, in English and Shona, which allowed girls to sew their own pads by hand. **Bonnie Lawson**, TNC's program

leader, also identified and purchased booklets on menstrual hygiene management to integrate health education with hand- and machine-sewing skills.

The program is now pushing forward with a two-part strategy: (1) Source materials in Zimbabwe to avoid dependence on U.S. supply chains, and (2) Train local professionals to provide sewing instruction for pad production, along with tailoring skills so girls and women have the opportunity to generate income.

"We want the Zimbabwean communities of women we serve to have no obstacles to living their lives and pursuing their work and studies," Bonnie says. "Moving toward local supply chains and 'training the trainers' is a logical next step in the program, which from the start has embraced local concerns and culturally appropriate education."

Leading the first strategy is local procurement agent **Knowledge Lindgren Janasi** (photo). Based in Harare, she has found domestic suppliers and overcome logistical issues to import materials when necessary. Supplies include cotton fabric, a waterproof material, needles and thread. TNC members met Knowledge in 2006, when she was being raised by **Sister Rut Lindgren**, a missionary nurse from Finland who lived in Nyadire. Knowledge flourished under Rut's care, excelled in school, and was often selected to be the head girl or prefect of her classes. After Rut's passing, she attended **Chinoyi University** and received a bachelor's degree in accounting. She settled in Harare and has worked hard to establish her own import business.

The second strategy is the establishment of a GEP scholarship fund to the **Tabudirira Vocational Training Centre** in Harare to train girls and women in tailoring skills. GEP scholarship recipients are required to teach pad sewing and other techniques to the students in Nyadire as a condition of their award. This ensures a pipeline of teaching talent as current teachers retire, and that sewing skills are an established offering within the GEP program.
