- Emmanuel Chiimba, administrator of the Home of Hope,



returned to Nyadire after completing a nine-month course at the **Rural Asian Institute in Japan.** He and other grass roots leaders were trained in sustainable and organic methods of farming. He plans to create a demonstration plot at the **Home of Hope** and initiate servant leadership where all take part in the work. The demonstration plot will provide evidence of healthier and safer crops that do not fail. (Commercial fertilizers and pesticides don't appear to be working.)

NEW BORE HOLE (WELL) DUG- WATER STORAGE INCREASED

First-hand account by resident Jimmy VanderShuur



"The big water project that was completed here three years ago gave us enough storage (the reservoirs) to store just about 1 million liters of water. We never had enough supply (the bore holes) to fill the reservoirs. That is why the mission residents are so excited by this project that we had a lot of spectators. If the amount of water that came out of the hole as we were drilling is any indication, then we drilled a very good bore hole. At 10 meters the soil was coming up wet. At 20 meters, water was pouring out of the top of the hole. At 26 meters, the water was

shooting out the top of the mast, which is 7 meters high. So much water was pouring back down the hole that the driller was afraid that the sides would cave in. At that depth they stopped drilling to put in the casing and change to a smaller drill bit so they could continue drilling through the center of the casing. By 35 meters the water was shooting 10 meters in the air. The only reason we didn't stop there is because the ground was very loose, like gravel. The driller said it would be better if it was in solid rock, so we would not have to put casing at the very bottom as the casing may hinder the flow of water. Our prayers were answered. We hit rock at 40 meters and drilled to 47 meters. The pump is in and the piping is completed. We are anxious to start using it. With this water, we hope to fill and keep two reservoirs full. MAY GOD BLESS ALL OF YOU, JIMMY"

Trip in Review: JULY 2015 to NYADIRE

The Eyeglass Project conducted by the July Mission Trip was made possible through a partnership with

Mission Vision, a Pittsburgh-based non-profit. Mission Vision partners with providers who deliver free eye exams and eyeglasses to those without homes and the working poor. VIM team members **Faith Geer**, **Molly Michael**, **Natalie Geer**, **Mark Boyer and son**, **Logan** were trained to screen a person's vision, then fit them with eyeglasses. Team leader Faith Geer recounts, "Although an optometrist does visit Nyadire, many cannot afford the services. We registered 332 people whose wait time in the sun could be 2 ½ - 3 hours. Many came from all around, including an elderly man who had walked 30 km. (18.5 miles) for the service. We carried over 2,000 donated eyeglasses packed in four suitcases for the project which will continue after our departure. Surgical nurse Elizabeth Muvi was trained in the screening and fitting processes."

ENGINEERS WITHOUT BORDERS - AUGUST 2015



An assessment team from the **Carnegie Mellon** chapter of **Engineers Without Borders (EWB)** visited Nyadire in August to assess their problems from intermittent electricity. ZESA, the national power company cannot meet the demand, and droughts further limit hydroelectric power generation. The student team, **Maddie Gioffre** (who visited Nyadire twice before), **Kavin Sanghavi, Allison Fisher**, and mentors **Matt Bovee** and **Drew Harvey** visited department heads and interviewed community leaders and individuals about power problems. Departments endorsed the importance of campus and pathway lighting, especially for students and incoming patients to the hospital. The team will analyze energy and street lighting options for Nyadire, evaluate technologies, and work with Nyadire to finalize a system design. EWB will then raise funds and return to Nyadire for implementation.

OCEAN CONTAINER LOADS- Arrived at Nyadire!

Beds and furnishings for **Nyahuku Cliinic**, school supplies and textbooks for seven **Outreach Schools**, backpacks for ~ 300 kids, sewing machines for the **Girls Empowerment Program**, vinyl rolls to cover hospital mattresses, medical supplies, choir robes, and two "Multi-Use vehicles" all came together and loaded into an ocean container at **Brother's Brother Foundation** in November for the first leg of a long journey.

Nyahuku Clinic - Building Again!



Construction of the Nyahuku clilnic began in March, 2015 with the demolition of the old clinic and construction of the inpatient and outpatient wards, staff housing, waiting mothers shelter, cooking area, patient waiting area, fencing, and toilet block. Some finishing and site work remain as well as final furnishings and upgrade to the solar system. However, the major outstanding item is a new borehole. Siting a productive water well in this extremely dry region is a challenge! Funds are still needed to provide additional staff housing, solar power, and furnishings.

Nyadire tracks consumption. The most common drugs can now be purchased in-country. Funds were recently sent to distributor "PCD" for drugs to restock Nyadire's pharmacy.




TNC adds new program – GIRL EMPOWERMENT PADS

area girls and women. They cut and assembled kits that will enable girls to sew their own reusable cotton sanitary napkins, so that they do not have to miss school for lack of protection. The kits consist of enough material and linings to make two pads, a pamphlet on personal hygiene, a pair of underwear, a bar of soap.
